

SUNYIT Breaks Ground for \$13.6 Million Student Center

First of four new buildings planned for campus

State legislators and other dignitaries joined faculty, staff and students October 23, 2008, in breaking ground for SUNYIT's \$13.6 million student center, the first of four major building projects planned on its campus in Marcy.

NYS Senator Joseph Griffo, Assemblywoman RoAnn Destito, Oneida County Executive Anthony Picente and other dignitaries joined SUNYIT President Wolf Yeigh at the event.

"We're pleased that our elected officials and friends are here to celebrate another step forward for SUNYIT," Yeigh said. "We thank you for your support."

"It's fitting that the first one we break ground on is the student center – we're putting students first," Yeigh said.

"The future of SUNYIT is very bright... investing in education and our young people is very important," Destito said. "I believe that SUNYIT will be a spotlight on our future economic development in this area."

"We've seen great growth at this campus and there's such tremendous capacity for future growth here," Griffo said. "The investment we make here is an investment in our regional economy." Officials said investment in infrastructure at the area's four-year public college is critically important for future regional workforce development, especially given the current state of the economy. They also said money for capital projects such as the student center is approved separately from operating budgets for

SUNY campuses, and capital money cannot be spent for other purposes. Funding for the student center was authorized in the state's 2005-06 capital budget.

Yeigh echoed SUNY Board of Trustees chair Carl Hayden, who told those gathered at a Rockefeller Institute conference that New York State needs the economic diversification that will come from investing in public higher education.

"As Chairman Hayden said recently, 'The future belongs to those who create, nurture and commercialize intellectual capital," Yeigh told the gathering. "SUNYIT's continued development – new buildings, new academic



programs, new partnerships – will benefit our current and future students as we support the economic development of the entire region."

The campus is also planning a \$20 million field house, a \$27.5 million advanced technology center, and a \$23.5 million residence hall. Actual construction of the student center will begin in 2009. ■



EARNING MORE AND GETTING LESS Why Successful Wives Can't Buy Equality Veronica Jaris Tichenor

Book Featured on CNN.com

SUNYIT faculty member Veronica Tichenor's book, *Earning More and Getting Less: Why Successful Wives Can't Buy Equality*, was featured recently in a CNN.com report entitled "When she earns more than he does."

Tichenor's book looks at the power dynamics in marriages where wives earn substantially more than their husbands. An excerpt from the CNN.com feature:

"They're struggling against the reality that she's earning more, but sometimes both of them – the husband and the wife – feel like the man should be the one who's earning more. It's hard to let go of that expectation," says Veronica Tichenor...Moreover, financial superiority may not afford women power, as it generally does for men...When a man is financially responsible for a family's well being, it usually 'buys' him out of household chores, according to Tichenor's research. He also tends to control the purse strings and be the decision

maker. However, the same standards don't apply when women are the primary earners. In fact, breadwinning wives actively uphold traditional familial roles by still doing more housework and deferring financial control to their husbands, Tichenor says.

Tichenor was also quoted in a September 15, 2008, *Washington Times* article headlined "Palin's 'Mr. Mom' a secret weapon? Appeal seen to blue-collar vote," and her book was previously featured in the *National Post*, a Canadian national newspaper.

Schneider Book Wins "Best Political Communication" Award

Web Campaigning, co-authored by Steve Schneider, professor and interim dean of the School of Arts & Sciences, and Professor Kirsten Foot of the University of Washington, has been selected as the winner of the Doris Graber Best Book Award by the Political Communication Section of the American Political Science Association. The award is given to "the best book published on political communication in the last ten years."

Published by MIT Press, *Web Campaigning* documents the dramatic expansion of the use of the Web in U.S. political campaigns over the course of the last several election seasons, and examines the evolution of campaigns' Web practices, based on analysis of hundreds of campaign Web sites produced by a range of political actors during the U.S. elections of 2000, 2002, and 2004.

A member of the faculty since 1991, Schneider earned a master of arts degree in communication from the University of Pennsylvania's Annenberg School of Communication, and a Ph.D. from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he studied American politics and communication technology. 


Faculty, Students Discuss Economic Crisis

SUNYIT nursing faculty, students make a difference in Brazil

From an outreach to those in need in a remote region to proposed partnerships with institutions in Brazilian cities, SUNYIT faculty and students are making connections between the classroom and the world community.

In March 2008, a team of Mohawk Valley health care professionals and students ventured up the Amazon River on a mission of mercy. Participants included Esther Bankert, dean of SUNYIT's School of Nursing & Health Systems, four members of the nursing faculty, and 15 SUNYIT nursing students.

Pat Zawko '99 '00, assistant professor of nursing, had wanted to take students to Brazil ever since she went as a graduate student six years ago.

Zawko contacted AMAS, a Brazilian social service agency, which partners with the United Methodist Church and World Vision, another humanitarian organization. The three organizations took care of all the logistics for the trip, but students and faculty still had their work cut out for them: vaccinations, passports, visas, weekly meetings to study Brazilian culture, and fundraising: students chipped in \$1,800 each for travel and sold candy, held a pancake breakfast, and accepted donations from supporters.

"The goal was not to impose our culture, but to understand another culture and to help them to be healthy within their own culture," Zawko said. The trip, which occurred over the March spring break, was a success: The group visited remote villages reachable only by boat, treating and providing health education to some 1,000 villagers.

Even before the trip was over, participants were talking about next steps – and a second team returned to the region in December 2008-January 2009.

In August 2008, a group of faculty and students traveled to Brazil to further explore a range of potential partnerships and opportunities for SUNYIT students, faculty and staff. The group visited three universities, and two SUNYIT nursing students did volunteer work in an orphanage for children with AIDS.

"We wanted to establish connections at the universities, and explore opportunities for collaboration, research and other partnerships for students and faculty," said Bankert. "There was a very high level of interest expressed by each of the universities we visited, especially for potential distance learning collaboration."

Bankert and others who visited Brazil in August said they were looking for connections with the three institutions in programs such as nursing, psychology, sociology, criminal justice and engineering.

"Several collaborative research projects have already emerged," said Joanne Joseph, continued on p. 10

associate professor of psychology. "Psychology and nursing faculty are working together to examine such topics as 'Adverse Childhood Experiences' – ACE – and their later effects on fibromyalgia and complications in teenage pregnancy."

Joseph said one of the three universities has invited SUNYIT faculty to present their research at an upcoming international conference in health psychology and to publish findings in a Brazilian academic journal.

A number of academic exchanges between SUNYIT and the Brazilian institutions were discussed, Bankert said:

- Faculty exchange of 1-2 weeks for meetings, discussion of collaboration, exploration of research ideas
- Student exchange of two weeks for students from SUNYIT and Brazilian partner institutions to trade places and earn one credit hour for the experience
- Distance learning possibilities in a number of areas, including Portuguese language classes

Bankert and others involved in what they describe as a five-year project say the outreach is a concrete demonstration of how students and faculty can turn experiences outside the classroom into true "community-based learning," in which learning and teaching lead to intellectual development and personal growth for participants — and service for those who need it, whether their community is across town or on another continent.

"We are always pleased to exhibit the works of students," said Connie Castellano '08, gallery director. "Guaruv wanted to share his love of travel and photography with others on our campus."





Wildcats Make Successful Transition to North Eastern Athletic Conference

The SUNYIT Wildcats have made a successful transition from the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) to the North Eastern Athletic Conference (NEAC), which they joined this past fall season. The transition showed immediate results, as many of the fall sports had record-setting seasons.

Each of the five SUNYIT fall sports - men's and women's cross country, golf, men's and women's soccer and women's volleyball - had a season to remember. Men's cross country finished the season as the runner-up in the NEAC Championship and placed four student-athletes on the NEAC All-Conference team: senior Jeremy West (Central Square, N.Y./Central Square), junior Ryan Darling (Jordan, N.Y./ Jordan-Elbridge) and freshmen Steven Busch (Ravena, N.Y./Ravena Coeymans Selkirk) and Robert Doss (Chittenango, N.Y./Chittenango). For the women's team, junior Alaina Spadaro (Holland Patent, N.Y./Holland Patent) was named to All-Conference First Team and also earned a NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award during the season. The men's golf team had a very successful season, finishing with two wins, two second-place finishes and a top-five finish. In addition, junior Jesse Smith (Binghamton, N.Y./Chenango Forks) earned a NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award for his first place individual finish at the Cazenovia Fall Classic in October.

Men's soccer had a tremendous season, finishing 10-7-2 overall and tying the school record for most wins in a season. The team also set SUNYIT season records for goals (30), goals per game (1.77), assists (25), points (85) and goals against average (1.85). In addition, the team made it to the semifinal round of the NEAC Championship Tournament and placed four athletes on the NEAC All-Conference Team: senior Andy Ambrose (Utica, N.Y./West Canada Valley) and juniors

Kevin Benjamin (Utica, N.Y./MVCC), David Martin (Marcy N.Y./MVCC) and Kevin Parks (Amsterdam, N.Y./FMCC). Women's soccer had similar success, winning a program-best eight games and advancing to the quarterfinal round of the NEAC Tournament. The team set program records for goals (54), goals per game (3.09), assists (40) and points (148), while placing three student-athletes on the NEAC All-Tournament team: senior Traci Bickelhaupt (Hammond, N.Y./Jefferson CC) and sophomores Jane Burroughs (Fonda, N.Y./Fonda-Fultonville) and Darilyn Brown (Middletown, N.Y./Middletown). In addition, Bickelhaupt and Burroughs both broke the program record for goals in a season with 14 each, while Burroughs also collected the most assists (9) and points (37) in a season in program history. Both student-athletes were recognized for the dominance throughout the season, as Burroughs took home a NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award while Bickelhaupt earned the honor three times, as well as an Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Player of the Week award.

Women's volleyball also had a sensational year, establishing a program-best 19-10 record during the regular season, which included

going 7-0 at home and 6-0 in NEAC play to become the first SUNYIT team to win a regular season conference championship. The accomplishment helped head coach Rebecca Fletcher earn the NEAC Coach of the Year award, while freshman Juleah Vedder (Dolgeville, N.Y./Dolgeville) was named the NEAC Player of the Year and was selected to the NEAC All-Conference team, along with seniors Hillary Pundt (Skaneateles, N.Y./Skaneateles) and Cherice Gibbons (Bronx, N.Y./ Grace Dodge) and sophomore Nicole Higgins (Sellersville, Pa./Penridge). In addition, Vedder was named the NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week three times, while Pundt and Higgins each received the honor once during the season. The team capped off its remarkable year by accepting the program's first-ever bid to the ECAC Championship Tournament.

According to SUNYIT Athletics Director Kevin Grimmer, the move from the SUNYAC to the NEAC was a necessary one in order for the school's student-athletes to gain a better overall athletic experience.

"For the past 16 years the SUNYAC provided the structure, organization and leadership which assisted in the development of our athletic program to this point," said Grimmer. "Our Wildcat sports program has evolved dramatically in recent years, but it's hard to gain an appreciation for how truly competitive our teams are gauged by our results in the SUNYAC. The NEAC provides a more appropriate level of competition for our intercollegiate teams and a better playing experience for our student-athletes."

Since SUNYIT has many similarities to the schools associated with the NEAC, the choice to join the conference seemed to be an easy one.

"The NEAC consists of institutions very similar to SUNYIT in terms of budget and resources, enrollment, sports sponsorship and facilities and, like the SUNYAC, awards automatic bids to the NCAA postseason for



conference champions," said Grimmer. "In the NEAC, our student-athletes are on a level playing field and our teams will have the opportunity to compete for those championships and postseason play."

SUNYIT joins SUNY Cobleskill (Cobleskill, N.Y.) as the two newest members of the NEAC, which also includes Cazenovia College (Cazenovia, N.Y.), D'Youville College (Buffalo, N.Y.), Keuka College (Keuka, N.Y.), Penn State University - Berks (Reading, Pa.), Penn State University - Harrisburg (Middletown, Pa.), Wells College (Aurora, N.Y.) and Wilson College (Chambersburg, Pa.). Associate members include the University of Dallas (Irving, Texas), Medaille College (Buffalo, N.Y.), SUNY Oneonta (Oneonta, N.Y.) and Rutgers Camden (Camden, N.J.). Beginning in the 2009-10 academic year, D'Youville will depart from the conference, while two new institutions will be accepted by the NEAC for full membership: the College of Saint Elizabeth (Morristown, N.J.) and Penn State University - Abington (Abington, Pa.).

"This (move) is exciting for our studentathletes, and for all of us – the coaches, staff, faculty, alumni and friends of the college," said SUNYIT President Wolf Yeigh. "The continuing development of athletics is an important part of student life here, and this is further evidence that SUNYIT is a growing and vibrant college."

The current roster of SUNYIT sports include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's bowling, men's and women's cross country, men's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and men's and women's volleyball.
